PURPOSE OF THE FUND:

The purpose of the Elizabeth Hardy Kanemoto Fund is to support post-secondary educational opportunities for graduates of Wausau East High School with an interest in the Fine Arts or Anthropology and planning to attend a four-year college or university.

APPLICATION PROCESS:

Students interested in this scholarship should complete the general scholarship application form through Wausau East's guidance office. The Wausau East Scholarship Selection Committee has been designated as the selection committee.

SELECTION GUIDELINES:

Preference for selection of the recipient will be given in the following manner:

- A graduating senior from Wausau East High School with a minimum 3.0 GPA,
- Interested in pursuing an education in the Fine Arts,
- With demonstrated financial need.
- Financial need will be weighted higher than GPA in the selection process.
- If there is no student who qualifies for funding pursuing a degree in the Fine Arts, a student is to be selected who is pursuing an education in Anthropology, and meets the criteria above.

ANNOUNCEMENT AND PAYMENT:

If available, a member of the Kanemoto family will make the presentation of the scholarship award at the schools' senior high awards ceremonies. If not available, a representative of the high school or the Community Foundation will make the presentation on behalf of the Kanemoto family. The recipients will receive a congratulatory letter from the Community Foundation after the awards ceremony, instructing them on how to receive their scholarship funding.

Scholarship funds will be paid by the Community Foundation directly to the school the student will be attending upon receipt of proof of registration to an accredited 4-year college or university.
