



ALLEN JOHNSON SCHOLARSHIP FOR THE TRADES

PURPOSE

To provide financial support for students and developing professionals who are committed to pursuing a career in the building trades.

APPLICATION PROCESS

Apply online by visiting www.cfoncw.org. Click on "Grants & Scholarships" / "Scholarships" / "Apply Online Now" to reach the online application portal and begin the registration and application process. If this is your first visit to the site, you will need to "Create an Account." If this is a return visit, enter your email address and password. Choose the appropriate application from the menu.

APPLICATION DEADLINE: March 31

YOUR APPLICATION MUST INCLUDE:

- A reference from a supervisor, mentor, or instructor who can attest to your commitment to the industry
- List of activities and organizations you have participated in
- Continuing students will be asked to provide a transcript of grades

ELIGIBILITY

- Applicants must be a resident of Marathon County, Wisconsin, OR attending an educational institution or professional development program in Marathon County
- Likely candidates for this scholarship will be in the process of executing plans to become a professional trades-person

For example: A candidate might be pursuing a career in plumbing, carpentry, or any other trade field and be in the process of qualifying for their journeyman-level licensing by taking special training through the union or supplementing their on-the-job experience with classroom-style learning at a post-high school institution like the technical college or a specialized training program.

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION

Applications will be evaluated, based on:

- Commitment to pursuing a career in the building trades
- Demonstration of how their involvement in the trades will impact other people and their community
- Financial need will be a consideration

PAYMENT OF THE SCHOLARSHIP

The recipient will receive correspondence from the Community Foundation after the award has been announced, instructing them on how to receive their scholarship funding.

The recipient must provide proof of registration to the Foundation office for payment to be initiated. Payment will be made directly to the institution where training will take place.

Allen Earl Johnson / 1931-2019

Al stepped quietly into his heavenly home on October 27, 2019. After a life well-lived, he had been looking forward to meeting His Savior and seeing the "place that Jesus had prepared for Him!" John 14:2-3

Al Johnson's enjoyment of building with his hands began early in life. As a teenager he worked for a local contractor where he learned the craft of an electrician. He enlisted in the Navy near the end of the Korean Conflict and developed his skills by specializing in the maintenance and repair of electrical systems in Navy aircraft. Upon his honorable discharge from the Navy, he enrolled at UW-Stout and earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in industrial/tech education. The exposure to all dimensions of construction tradecraft deeply embedded and solidified his life-long love of the trades and respect for trades-focused professions. During his 30-year career with the Wausau School District, Al introduced students to this passion by challenging and encouraging them with real world, practical experiences that would prepare them to pursue trades-related careers. His teaching talent gained respect throughout the state and the honor of being named Wisconsin Teacher of the Year by his students and colleagues in the 1980s.

His passion, which continued into retirement, was contagious, resulting in his sons and many of his students pursuing professional endeavors in the trades.

It was his life-long appreciation for trades people that led his family to establish this scholarship in his memory, to help attract and encourage hard-working professionals to pursue a career in the building trades.
