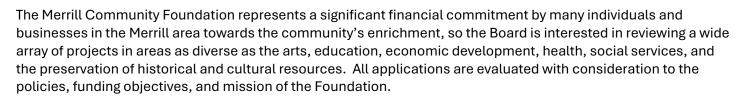
APPLICATION PROCEDURE AND GUIDELINES

The Merrill Community Foundation meets quarterly to conduct business and review grant proposals from nonprofit organizations wishing to join in fulfilling its mission of supporting local organizations that seek to enrich the Merrill area community now and into the future.

Application Deadline: Electronic applications must be submitted by 5 p.m. on the first business day in the months of January, April, July, and October to be considered in that grant cycle.
